BRAZOS COUNTY YOUTH LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION BY-LAWS

Adopted January 14, 2004

Amended June 12, 2006

Amended June 18, 2007

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this Association shall be the Brazos Youth Livestock, Inc., DBA Brazos County Youth Livestock Association, a not for profit corporation under the Internal Revenue Service Code, Section 501 C-3, Federal ID Number 74-1957546. The date of incorporation in the state of Texas is March 1977.

ARTICLE II

Purpose and Program

The purpose of this Association shall be for the education of the youth of Brazos County with an emphasis on agriculture. The Association shall hold not less than one show in each fiscal year, but may hold more shows at the discretion of the Board of Directors. In the event of a natural disaster beyond the control that prevent the show from being held within that fiscal year, the Board of Directors, may at its discretion choose to not have a show. The time and place of the show(s) shall be fixed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section I – Membership

All exhibitors of any market item exhibited in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show are required to be members of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association. Any person interested in the education of the youth in the related agricultural fields of business, may become a member of the Association upon completion of his/her application and the acceptance and approval of the Association.

Section 2 – Types of Memberships

ANNUAL MEMBER – Any person whose application for membership has been accepted by the Association and whose dues for the current year have been paid shall be considered an Annual Member. A member can either be considered single or family membership. A single member shall be entitled to one vote at the annual meeting, and a family membership shall be entitled to three votes at the annual meeting.

HONORARY MEMBER – The Board of Directors shall name and give special recognition to any person who has rendered some special services to the Association. Honorary members shall pay no dues and shall have no vote in the meetings of the membership.

The membership of the Association shall consist of all those people as stated above. They shall hold meetings as directed in the by-laws and shall elect the Board of Directors of the Association.

Section 3 – Disciplinary Action

Any member (single or family member) of any of the above classifications may be suspended or expelled at the discretion of the Board of Directors, whenever said Board of Directors feels that the membership of any person is detrimental to the good and welfare of the Association. Such suspension shall take place by written notification to the member and upon receipt of such notification; said member shall stand suspended or expelled for a length of time as determined by the Board of Directors. This disciplinary action shall also apply to any and all immediate family members.

ARTICLE IV

Membership Meetings

The annual meeting of the membership shall be held on the 2nd Thursday in May of each year, unless such date shall be a legal holiday, or unless such meeting be postponed for cause by majority vote of the Board of Directors. Special meetings may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by a vote of the Board of Directors, upon giving of at least ten (10) and no more than twenty-one (21) day written notice to all the members, with said notice to be mailed to the last known address as shown on the membership roll. It is specifically provided that the number of members present at any meeting, which has been properly called, shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V

Board of Directors

SECTION 1 – Number and Terms of Office

The Board of Directors shall consist of a total membership of twelve (12) who shall all be members in good standing with the Association. Directors shall serve a three (3) year term with one-third (1/3) of the Directors terminating each year. No Director shall serve more than three (3) consecutive terms of office, but may be re-elected after a break in service.

The Nominating Committee shall have the right to name persons serving in public, educational, industry or business capacities to serve as ex-officio members of the Board of Directors, without vote.

SECTION 2 – Election of the Board of Directors

The members of the Board of Directors shall be selected from the membership and elected by majority vote of the members of the Association present at the annual meeting of the membership. Only members whose dues are paid and current with the association will be considered a voting member. Directors shall hold office as set forth in Section 1, Article V or until their successors are duly elected and have qualified.

SECTION 3 – Vacancies

If the office of any Director becomes vacant for any reason, the Chairman of Board, with a majority vote approval of the Board of Directors may chose a successor, who shall hold office for the unexpired term in respect to which such vacancy occurred.

SECTION 4 – Powers of the Board of Directors

The Board of Directors shall be a policy-making Board and have responsibility for the affairs and funds of the Association. The Board of Directors shall designate the Officers, any two of whom are empowered to issue checks for and on behalf of the Association. The Board may not make any assessment upon the members without their consent expressed by vote at any annual or special meeting of the members.

SECTION 5 - Meetings

The Board of Directors shall meet when called by the Chairman of the Board, or in his absence, the President. Notice of such meetings shall be at least five (5) days in advance of called date. The meetings may be held at any time or place designated in the call, and a majority of the Board in attendance shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI

Officers

Officers of the Association shall be: Chairman of the Board President Two (2) Vice-Presidents Secretary Treasurer

These officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors present at the first called meeting of the Board after the annual membership meeting. The Board of Directors shall have the authority, by majority vote; to remove and replace any Officer elected under these By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII

Duties and Terms of the Officers

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

The Chairman of the Board shall preside at all Board meetings. In the event of his absence, or inability to act, the President shall preside.

PRESIDENT

The President shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the membership. He shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, in the absence of the Chairman of the Board. He shall have the power to execute, or to supervise and authorize the execution of, contracts on behalf of the Association; shall represent the Association at any and all times when he deems it necessary to do so; and shall carry out the policies and plans of the Board of Directors. He shall serve as an ex-officio member of all committees. Whenever the President may be incapacitated or otherwise unable to act, the Chairman of Board shall name an acting President from the Officers or Board of Directors, and while he shall serve, he shall have all the powers of the President.

VICE-PRESIDENTS, SECRETARY, TREASURER

The President shall assign the Vice-Presidents to supervise the activities of various committees (other than the Nominating Committee) and report to the President and as requested or as deemed advisable, to the membership and the Board of Directors at the meetings.

The Secretary shall direct and supervise the keeping of all records of the Association, shall see that the minutes of each meeting and all records pertaining thereto are retained and preserved.

The Treasurer shall direct the keeping of all books of account, the collection of all monies due to the Association and the depositing of such funds in a bank or banks, acceptable to the Board of Directors.

Officers shall serve for a term of one (1) year beginning on the date of their election to office unless they shall sooner resign or be removed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

No Officer, or member of the Board of Directors, shall enter into any contract with the Association in which the interest of such individual and that of Association may conflict, unless such contract be approved by vote of at least two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the Board of Directors present at any meeting at which a quorum is present. No Officer of the Association shall draw any salary or receive any compensation from the Association by reason of services as an Officer of the Association.

ARTICLE IX

Committees

A Membership committee and such other Committees as may be needed and a Chairman to head each such Committee shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board. The President of the Association shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. The Committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after he/she assumes office and shall serve until the committee has

completed its work or until the next annual meeting, whichever time is first. The Chairman of each committee will report the activities of the committee to the Board of Directors.

A. The Chairman of the Board, the President, two Vice Presidents, the Secretary, and the Treasurer(s) shall constitute the Nominating Committee to nominate eligible members for election to the Board of Directors to be filled at the Annual Meeting of Membership, and to nominate Officers for election at the meeting of the Board of Directors called for the purpose of electing Officers.

If any member entitled to vote contemplates nominating a person for the Board of Directors, such member shall provide written notification to the Secretary of the Association at the Association's principal office not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting, accompanied by the written consent of the person to be nominated.

The Nominating Committee shall reserve the right to finalize the official ballot to not more six (6) qualified applicants from the nominations presented for vote by the membership at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE X

Fiscal Year of Association

The fiscal year of the Association shall commence on May 1 and end on April 30 of each year to coincide with the Internal Revenue Service guidelines for the Association.

ARTICLE XI

These By-Laws may be altered, changed, added to, or amended, at any regular or special meeting of Board of Directors, provided that five (5) days notice shall be given of the intention to so alter. Said alterations, changes, additions, or amendments shall be passed upon by the vote of a majority of the Board of Directors present and voting at any meeting called for the purpose.

Important Rules Changes and Reminders for 2010

The following rule changes will be enforced/implemented for the 2010 Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.

1. Academically *ineligible* exhibitor's *animals MAY NOT* show in the 2010 Brazos County Youth Livestock Show. Additionally, exhibitors who have an extra-curricular activity conflict during the time that their animal is to be shown or sold may request to have a substitute exhibitor provided proper documentation is provided BEFORE THE SHOW. *Please see Rule Number 10 in the General Rules and Regulations section for a more detailed explanation concerning substitute exhibitor guidelines.*
2. For the market steer and goat shows, a percentage per class will be used to determine sale lots.
3. Barrows **MUST** weigh at least 230 pounds and not more than 275 pounds at the time that weigh cards are due.
4. An applicant for the BCYLA scholarship must be a member of BCYLA, 4-H or FFA. She/he must be an active exhibitor in the BCYLS their junior and senior year in High School.
5. BCYLS Agricultural Mechanics Project Show Maximum Entries: Each exhibitor may enter up to five individual or up to five group projects or a combination of up to five individual and group projects. No exhibitor may enter more than five projects either group and/or individually constructed.
6. BCYLS Queen Contest Eligibility: The contestant must be a freshman, sophomore, junior, or senior and a member of 4-H or FFA and BCYLA. They must have been an exhibitor in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show the previous year and a current exhibitor in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.
7. The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Baked Goods and Canned Goods will be sold at the auction. In addition, the Champion from each of the other 6 Divisions (Clothing, Arts & Crafts, Woodworking, Metalworking, Ornamental Horticulture, and Photography) will be sold at the auction. The two Baked Goods must be freshly baked the day of the auction.
8. Market Barrows, Market Lambs & Goats, Market Steers, and Market Rabbits will arrive on Friday, March 26 according to the 2010 Daily Show Schedule.
9. Heifer Show has been instated for 2010 show.
10. Rabbits: One exhibitor may enter two (2) pens of market rabbits.

2010 General Rules and Regulations

1. Eligibility of Exhibitors

- A. All exhibitors of any market, commercial or family and consumer sciences item in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show shall be members of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.
- B. Exhibitors in the market, commercial or family and consumer sciences show must be residents of Brazos County, bonafide 4-H and/or FFA members of Brazos County, Texas, and enrolled in a public or private school of less than college level, unless otherwise approved by the Board of Directors of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.
To exhibit in the 2010 Brazos County Youth Livestock Show, 4-H or FFA members must meet the following criteria: 8 years old and in the 3rd grade or 9 years of age as of September 1, 2009. Exhibitors must be certified by a Brazos County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher except where otherwise stated in this premium list.
- C. An exhibitor can show in only one local or county premium market show with an auction as approved by the Board of Directors (excluding the breeding shows).
- D. Exhibitors and owner will have continuously and personally fed and cared for their entries under the direct supervision of a County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher of Brazos County.

2. Application for Entry

- A. All applications for entries must be made on official Brazos County Youth Livestock Show entry forms and in accordance with instructions on the form. These forms must be signed by the exhibitor and supervising County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher.
- B. Entry fees WILL NOT be refunded and are as follows. Checks should be made payable to the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association. Refer to current year calendar for entry dates.
Late entries for market animals and FCS division only will be accepted up to two weeks after the deadline at a penalty of ten (10) times the specified entry fee.
- C. **Exhibitors may exhibit at the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show ONLY the number of market animals that they validated AND entered in the BCYLS. NOTE: Exhibitors CANNOT bring more animals than entered in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.**

All animals not entered in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show must pay a tagging fee of \$5.00 per animal.

3. Interpretation and Violation of Rules

- A. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves to its management (current Chairman of the Board and Show President) the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and the right to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine and settle all matters, questions and differences in regard to these rules.
- B. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all such privileges and premiums afforded by the stock show as management may order.
- C. Any member (single or family member) may be suspended or expelled at the discretion of the Board of Directors, whenever said Board of Directors feels that the membership of any person is detrimental to the good and welfare of the Association. Such suspension shall take place by notification to the member of such action be the Board of Directors and, upon receipt of such notification said member shall stand suspended or expelled, as the case may be for a term determined by the Board of Directors. This disciplinary action shall also apply to any immediate family members.
- D. No exhibitor may be disqualified from competition without show management approval.

4. Statement of Liability

All exhibitors will be under the control and direction of the management, but the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association will in no case be responsible for any loss, injury or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury of damage done to or arising from

any entry exhibited. All exhibitors shall indemnify the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

5. Objectionable Exhibits

- A. The management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit that may be falsely entered or deemed unsuitable without assigning any reasons therefore.
- B. No exhibit is to be purchased from the judge of the same division.
- C. The management, if necessary, will return any money already paid for entry fee or fees which shall exonerate the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association from any claim whatsoever on the part of the exhibitor.
- D. DELETED: See Drug Use Policy
- E. If an exhibitor has been disqualified from the competition in a major show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the ground of rule violation involving misrepresentation, fraud or deception, he/she will not be allowed to compete in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.
- F. If a junior exhibitor is found in violation of any of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show rules, he/she and his/her family may be forever barred from showing in the BCYLS.

6. Animal Health Rules

All BCYLS exhibitors will follow the Texas Animal Health Commission Rules and Regulations Governing Admission of Livestock into Shows, Fairs and Exhibits.

7. Protest

- A. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a \$100.00 deposit, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest shall state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the management immediately following the occasion for such a protest.
- B. Any protest as to the eligibility of any entry or exhibitor must be filed with the management prior to the day on which they are to be judged.
- C. Protests against the judge's decision will not be accepted by management and the decision of the judges shall be final except in cases where fraud or collusion is discovered.

8. Special Rules

Special rules or conditions are published in each division where necessary and if there is a conflict between the special rules and the general rules and regulations, the special rules will govern.

9. Care of Animals, Stalls and Pens

- A. All exhibits must remain in assigned areas until released by the livestock superintendent.
- B. Exhibitors are required to feed, water and care for their own exhibits.
- C. All exhibits, stalls and pens and adjacent areas of exhibition must be cleaned and presented for display before 8:00 a.m. each day and refuse matter disposed of in the appropriate containers or as directed by management.
- D. If exhibitors refuse to keep their assigned areas and/or exhibits clean and neat, the management reserves the right to have said areas and/or exhibits properly cleaned with the cost to be charged against the exhibitor.
- E. There will be no hay or straw used in bedding livestock.
- F. There will be no clipping or blocking of animals except in approved areas. The superintendent of facilities and division chairperson will establish approved areas for grooming of exhibits.
- G. No trailers will be permitted to park inside the pavilion except those used by the facilities superintendent.

10. Exhibition of Entries

- A. The owner must be in attendance to exhibit and sell his/her own entry in the market show, commercial show, and family and consumer sciences show. If an exhibitor is determined to be academically ineligible, then the entry is ineligible.

EXCEPTION: A substitute exhibitor may be used under the following conditions:

- 1. When an exhibitor has more than one (1) entry in a class, or
- 2. When an exhibitor is sick (request must be accompanied by a signed statement from a doctor), or
- 3. When an exhibitor is participating in an approved school activity (TAAS test, athletic event, etc). This request must be accompanied by a signed statement from the exhibitors school principal or designee on school letterhead.

In instances 10-A-2 and 10-A-3 above, a formal substitute exhibitor request *MUST* be made *PRIOR TO OFFICIAL CHECK-IN AT THE SHOW* to the division chairperson from which the exhibitor is entered and the Chairman of the Board for the BCYLA.

Substitute exhibitors *MUST* have at least one (1) project entered in the current Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.

- B. Exhibitors in the breeding show may enter as many animals as desired, but must be the owner of each animal entered.

- C. The schedule of judging exhibits, as published, will be followed as closely as possible. Exhibitors are responsible for ascertaining the time their entries are to be judged and any entry not presented promptly on schedule, or when the class is called by the arena director, will be ruled out and barred from competition in the class called. No complaint or protest that the judge failed to see the entry will be considered by the show management.
- D. When an exhibitor is called upon to furnish one or more entries for use in the judging contest and clinic, the exhibitor is expected to do so. Refusing to allow an entry to be used in this manner for any cause not meeting with the approval of the show management will result in forfeiture of all privileges afforded by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show and be barred from further participation in the show. Entries used in the judging contest and clinic will be selected through the division chairperson and insofar as possible will be obtained from those who wish to cooperate with the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.
- E. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to re-weigh any placing entry at the time of judging and declare any entry ineligible that fails to meet the weight tolerance for that division.
- F. In the case of an overweight or underweight animal, the exhibitor may request that the scales be cleaned, re-balanced and the animal re-weighed only once immediately. Re-weighing at a later time is prohibited.
- G. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges or attempting to influence their decision will have his/her exhibits barred from competition and shall receive no awards.
- H. All exhibitors should be dressed in appropriate show clothes on the night of the sale. *No decorations on any animals will be allowed on sale night.*
- I. Market animals previously sold at any other livestock show are not eligible for the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.
- J. Any exhibitor who wishes his/her picture made, must make their own arrangements with the show photographer.

11. Selection of Judges

A committee of five people to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Directors, the Show President and three other association advisors will meet to review a list of qualified judges and to select from that list people to be contacted and asked to serve as judges for the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show. Judges names will be randomly drawn and contacted in the order they are drawn. Judges will be invited back two (2) years unless the judge chooses not to return or the committee chooses not to invite the judge back. The judges committee has the authority to set judges' fees.

12. Showmanship

Showmanship contests will be held in each division.

A. Exhibitors must own their animal in order to participate in the showmanship contest. For the showmanship contest, age categories are determined by the exhibitors' birthday as of September 1st the previous year. The age categories are as follows:

Senior Division	14 years and over
Intermediate Division	11 - 13 years old
Junior Division	3 rd grade - 10 years old

13. No inhumane or abusive actions, such as hot shots, shall be allowed in any division during the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show.

14. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserved to management the right to make any unannounced visits to the project *any time* during the feeding period.

15. CHAPTER 87, CIVIL PRACTICE AND REMEDIES CODE

UNDER TEXAS LAW (CHAPTER 87, CIVIL PRACTICE AND REMEDIES CODE), A LIVESTOCK SHOW SPONSOR IS NOT LIABLE FOR AN INJURY TO OR THE DEATH OF A PARTICIPANT IN A LIVESTOCK SHOW RESULTING FROM THE INHERENT RISKS OF LIVESTOCK SHOW ACTIVITIES.

Premium Auction Rules

1. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association sponsors a premium auction for market and family & consumer sciences classes. The total number of sale lots are limited to 200 Market Animals and 10 FCS Projects.
2. The number of sale lots from each division will be based upon the number of entries arriving at the show in that division. When an exhibitor has more than two (2) entries arriving at the show in a division, only two (2) will be counted as entries arriving at the show. *Example: if an exhibitor arrives at the show with six (6) steers, only two (2) will be counted in the number of steer entries.*
3. The number of sale lots from a division in the sale will be a percentage based upon the number of arrivals for each division (as calculated above) divided by the number of total market animal arrivals multiplied by 200 with the following minimum and maximum criterion:

If the number of calculated sale lots in a division falls below the above calculated minimum, then the number of sale lots in that division will be recalculated by multiplying the number of arrivals in that division (as calculated above) by a figure of sixty percent (60%) provided this figure does not extend the total sale lots above 200 or the maximum of lots for that species. The above minimum and maximum will be reviewed annually.

4. Each exhibitor is limited in the sale to the following:
 - A. Any two (2) items of a division with the exception of halter and commercial steers. An exhibitor will be allowed to sell two beef projects, but only one from the halter steer division and one from the commercial steer division.
 - B. The next ranking entry in the sale order or same class, as applicable, will replace ineligible sale lot winners if one exhibitor has more sale lots than authorized from the premium auction.
 - C. If any exhibitor has more than two (2) entries eligible for the premium auction, they must notify the recording secretary on Sunday of the show, in writing, by 8:00 p.m. or at the conclusion of the market steer show, whichever is sooner, which entry or entries are to be dropped. Failure to do so will necessitate that the show management make this determination.

- D. For the Junior Commercial Steer Sale, only steers grading Select or higher will be eligible to sell. Sixty percent (60%) of the commercial steer pens arriving at the show will be sold, with a minimum of ten (10) pens selling.
 - E. Premium sale eligibility for all market barrows, steers, and goats will be determined by using a percentage-per-class calculation.
 - F. **Grand Champion** and **Reserve Grand Champion** of each market species, baked goods and canned goods **MUST** sell regardless of the two item rule. All **Breed Champions** (**NOT RESERVE BREED CHAMPIONS**) are required to sell provided that the exhibitor two item rule is not exceeded.
 - G. ***Premium Sale Eligibility Exception – Reserve Breed Champion:*** Within a show division that places Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions and utilizes the percentage per class model for the determination of eligibility for the Premium Sale, the Reserve Breed Champion shall be eligible to sell in lieu of a percentage-eligible placing exhibit shown in a separate class and replace the lower placing exhibit from the Premium Sale. {Explanation: This rule intends to allow for the top two placing animals within a breed division to sell when at least two exhibits are eligible within that division. For explanation purposes, the British Division of the Market Steer Show can be used as an example. Consider the situation where there are two classes of British Steers with 4 entries in Class 1 and 5 entries in Class 2, and percentage calculations indicate Class 1 to have 1 eligible Premium Sale lot and Class 2 to have 2 eligible Premium Sale lots (for a total of 3 British Steers eligible for the Premium Sale). If the judge finds the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion from Class 1, both the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion will be eligible for the Premium Auction while only the 1st place British Steer will be eligible from Class 2.}
5. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association will provide an official photographer to make photographs of all grand champions and reserve grand champions with the exhibitor and their buyer(s). The exhibitor is responsible for providing a picture to each of their buyers. The cost of these photographs shall be paid for by the exhibitor. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to use these photographs for publicity and illustrations in future publications.
 6. Exhibitors are *REQUIRED* to write a proper thank you note to the buyer(s) of their sale lot.

THE BRAZOS COUNTY YOUTH LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION (BCYLA) WILL CLERK THE PREMIUM AUCTION. PAYMENT FOR ALL SALE LOTS AND ADD-ON BIDS WILL BE PAID THROUGH THE BCYLA. EXHIBITORS SHOULD NOT ATTEMPT TO COLLECT PAYMENT FROM BUYERS. TO RECEIVE PAYMENT, EACH EXHIBITOR SHOULD DELIVER A THANK YOU NOTE READY FOR MAILING TO THE PREMIUM AUCTION CLERKS. DO NOT SUBMIT THANK YOU NOTES TO COUNTY EXTENSION AGENTS OR AGRICULTURE SCIENCE TEACHERS. YOUR CHECK WILL BE MAILED TO YOU ONCE THE BCYLA VERIFIES THAT YOU HAVE DELIVERED YOUR THANK YOU NOTE AND RECEIVED PAYMENT FROM YOUR BUYER(S).

7. All market steers and market barrows that sell in the premium auction sale and those going to resale will be assessed a \$1.00 per head fee as required by the Beef and Pork Check-Off Programs. All market lambs selling in the premium auction or those going to resale will be assessed the mandatory national lamb check-off fee. All fees will be paid by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

Procedure For Rule Formulation

1. A critique form is printed in each show catalog. The same critique form printed in the catalog will be also be printed as a separate item and distributed to Agriculture Science Teachers, Extension Agents and adult leaders for distribution to pertinent parties for return to the livestock show general manager within one week of the completion of the show. Copies of the critique form will also be given to each show division chairperson for distribution to each of the division's exhibitors at the time of the show to be returned to the show division chairperson or general manager within one week after the show.
2. The division chairpersons of the Association will review the critique forms presented and make rule change recommendations in writing to the show management.
3. The association membership, during the general meeting, will be presented a summary of the division chairpersons recommendations. The presentation will be for informative purposes and discussion. Voting to show support for or against proposed rules will follow. Any additional recommendations other than those put forward by the division chairpersons may be presented at that time in writing.
4. The current year show president and show administration will formulate a draft of the rules for the current year show.
5. The draft of the rules for the current year show will then be presented to the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association Board of Directors for approval.
6. The approval draft of the current year rules will be submitted to the current year show president for printing and distribution.
7. If a rule as presented in the current year draft of the rules is not acceptable at Step 5, the draft will be returned to Step 4 (current year show president and show administration) for reworking and representation through Step 5.

Drug Use Policy

Brazos Youth Livestock, Inc., DBA Brazos County Youth Livestock Association (the “Show”) is organized for the education of youth in Brazos County with an emphasis on agriculture. In accordance with the Bylaws of the Show, a livestock exposition shall be held at least once each year (the “Livestock Show”).

- 1. Enforcement:** Any violation of this Drug Use Policy shall be subject to penalties, said penalties to be enforced at the sole and absolute discretion of the Board through the Board’s Drug Committee. Penalties could include, but are not limited to, loss of any and all sales proceeds and awards, as well as Exhibitor being permanently banned from exhibiting in the Show or any Show in the future.
- 2. Certificate Forms:** Exhibitors are required to have a drug certification form signed by the following (a) Exhibitor; and, (b) Parent or Guardian. The Drug Certification Form shall be signed at validation and no Exhibitor will be allowed to show an animal without this certification form properly filled out, notarized and returned to the Livestock Show secretary.
- 3. Drug Certification Agreement:** Exhibitor and parent/guardian certify that none of Exhibitors entries have been administered or that the Exhibitor and parent/guardian does not have any knowledge that any of Exhibitors entries have received any substance not approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) for food animals or extra label use not supervised by a veterinarian. Furthermore, the Exhibitor and parent/guardian certifies that all of Exhibitors entries are free and clear of **ALL** drug and chemical residue withdrawal and elimination time periods.
- 4. Animal/Exhibitor Disqualification:** To foster fair competition, to provide a level playing field and to protect the safety of food, the showing of unethically fitted livestock or animals being administered unapproved drugs is strictly prohibited. Animals that have been administered an approved drug or chemical must allow sufficient time so that the drug or chemical is completely eliminated from the animals system at the time of weigh in.
 - a. Unethical Fitting:** Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means. Unethical fitting includes the use of injections or feeding of material not conducive to the health of the animal, safety of food or marketability of its carcass. Unethical fitting also includes, but is not limited to, artificially filling animals by stomach pumping, airing injections and bruising. Animals showing signs of having been unethically fitted will be disqualified.
 - b. Prohibited Drug Use:** The showing of any animal that has been administered during its life any quantity of any prohibited drug, chemical or medication is strictly prohibited. Such drugs include, but are not limited to, any diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other prohibited medication. A list of Prohibited Drugs can be found on the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) website.

- c. **Approved Drug Use:** If an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for their particular species or if extra label drugs have been used under the guidance of a veterinarian, sufficient time must have passed so that the animal does not test positive for that drug at weigh-in. **All animals must be free and clear of all drug and chemical residues at the time of weigh-in.** Please note that elimination time (the time it takes for no drug residue to be found in the system) is generally longer than the labeled FDA withdrawal time for most approved drugs.
 - d. **Animal Inspection:** As condition for participation in the Livestock Show, Exhibitor must agree to submit any animal entered by the Exhibitor for inspection. Exhibitor agrees to have such animal submitted to any tests requested by the Show. Exhibitor also agrees that the opinion reached by the Show or its officials as to whether such animal is unethically fitted shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. Further, the Show specifically reserves the right to have tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the laboratory as to whether such animal has been administered a diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication, or has not been completely eliminated from approved drugs shall be final and binding without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. An Exhibitor of an animal testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show.
 - e. **Unmanageable Animals:** The Show may disqualify any animal deemed unmanageable. Tranquilizers and sedatives for food animals are not approved by FDA.
 - f. **Emergency Treatment:** If an animal requires emergency treatment while on Show grounds, only the Official Show veterinarian will be allowed to administer any drug, chemical or feed additive. Animals which are administered treatments with a withdrawal or extended elimination time period will be disqualified from competition. Furthermore, the Official Show Veterinarian, in agreement with Show Management, reserve the right to treat any animal if, in the opinion of the Official Show Veterinarian, it is in the best interest of the animal's health and wellbeing to be treated. If the Official Show Veterinarian administers treatment to an animal, and therefore uses any medication that does not meet the appropriate withdrawal and or elimination time, will be determined ineligible for competition.
 - g. **Treatment Cost:** All treatment costs are the responsibility of the Exhibitor.
5. **Wholesome Meat Act:** The USDA Wholesome Meat Act applies to all market livestock. Only animals eligible for immediate slaughter may be brought onto the grounds and exhibited:
- a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
 - b. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - c. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.
- The Show will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of carcasses or the sale price of the animal. In such cases, the Exhibitor forfeits all rights to any and all proceeds including: Auction Price, Scholarships, Premium Awards, Market (Floor) Price and Special Awards.

- 6. Disclaimer of Warranties:** The Show expressly disclaims any express or implied warranties (including merchantability), whether the goods or services are provided by the Show or by others (such as drug testing). The Show does NOT provide security or guard services for individual exhibits and is not responsible for the acts of third parties. Exhibitor and Exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that the Show shall be entitled to disqualify any Exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug even if the Exhibitor and the Exhibitor's parents or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and had no role in the administration of the drug shown by the drug test. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the Show shall be entitled to disqualify the Exhibitor. Disqualification results in forfeiture of all prize money and auction proceeds.
- 7. Disqualification/Condemnation of Animal:** The Show reserves the right to condemn and/or disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the use of drugs, chemicals or feed additives as described in Rule 4, 4a, 4b and 4c, and the Exhibitor will forfeit all auction sale and/or premium money if the animal is disqualified. If an animal(s) is disqualified for testing positive and/or the carcass condemned at slaughter, the class placing will not change. An Exhibitor of an animal testing positive for any drug or medication or unapproved chemical may forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock in the future at the Show. Additionally, no animal shall be administered any drug, chemical or illegal feed additive while on Show grounds without the Official Show veterinarian administering as described above in Section 4(f), or the Exhibitor will be subject to the penalties described in this paragraph.
- 8. Ultimate Care and Responsibility:** By making entry into the Livestock Show the Exhibitor agrees and understands that ultimate care and responsibility for an animal(s) rest solely upon the Exhibitor until such time that possession of the animal is turned over to the Show and/or its agent(s). The use by non-veterinarians* of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by FDA is a violation of federal law. Exhibitor and Exhibitor's parents and/or guardians agree that: (1) they are absolutely responsible persons for the care and custody of their animals, (2) the Show shall be entitled to disqualify an Exhibitor whose animal tests positive for any drug, even if the Exhibitor and the Exhibitor's parents or guardians are innocent of any wrongdoing and did not administer the drug, (3) the drug test results of the testing laboratories are final and binding upon the Exhibitor and the Exhibitor's parents and/or guardians. Even if the source of the drug is unknown, the Show shall be entitled to disqualify the Exhibitor.
- * Abuse of the extra-label privilege by veterinarians is unethical and is subject to serious consequences such as license revocation.

Special Rules for Market Barrows

1. Validation

To be eligible to enter, all market barrows must be validated with during the Texas Swine Validation Program administered by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency, division of Agriculture Science and Technology OR during the BCYLS market barrow validation program. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to have hair follicle samples collected for DNA analysis by the Official Show Veterinarian, or his/her designated agent on the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market barrow, as well as any other randomly selected market barrows. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal shall be disqualified and all trophies, awards and premium auction money received by the exhibitor in connection with this exhibit shall be forfeited and the exhibitor's immediate family shall have a permanent life-time ban from entering or participating in any event sponsored or produced by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

2. Terminal Show

The barrow show is terminal. Following the show, the destination of all barrows will be determined by the BCYLA management.

3. Grooming

No oil, paint, powder or other dressings will be permitted on barrows in the show ring. Only water will be allowed.

4. Animal Eligibility

No gilts will be shown in this division. Barrows of any breed or cross can be shown. Barrows must be owned and cared for by the exhibitor on and after the date of tag-in/validation.

5. **Classification**

A. Market barrows will be classified according to Barrow Classification Standards at the time of arrival/check-in at the show by a 3-person classification team approved by show management. All decisions of the classifier will remain final. No exceptions.

B. Breed divisions anticipated should include: Chester White, Duroc, Hampshire, Cross, Yorkshire and Other Pure Breeds (OPB).

C. There must be nine (9) market swine of a breed to make a breed division, otherwise, they will show in the OPB class.

6. **Weigh Cards**

*For the 2010 show, official weights will be recorded **by exhibitors** on official Brazos County Youth Livestock Show weigh cards. These cards will be distributed by the division chairperson(s) to exhibitors during arrival and check-in. Weigh cards will be due to the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show Office by 1:00 p.m. on the arrival date.*

Practice scales will be set up throughout the swine barn for exhibitors to use.

7. **Minimum and Maximum Weight**

A. Barrows must weigh at least 230 pounds and not more than 275 pounds at the time that weigh-cards are due.

B. A minimum of three (3) barrows in each class will be re-weighed following the judging of each class. (More could be re-weighed, at the judge's discretion.) Entries weighing more than five percent (5%) above or below *the official entry weight* will be sifted and the next place barrow will be moved up.

C. Each breed and reserve breed champion will be re-weighed before the championship selection.

8. **Classes**

Barrows will be evenly divided into weight classes in their breed divisions. Determination of number of weight classes will be based on the number of exhibits entered in that breed division. A minimum of seven (7) will be required to make a weight class and multiples of seven (7) to make more classes. The market barrow committee will make available to all exhibitors the number of weight classes and specific weights of each breed division following the weigh-in of all barrows at the show.

9. **Champion Selection**

The Grand Champion barrow will be selected from the breed champions from all breed divisions. The Reserve Grand Champion barrow will be selected from the reserve breed champion barrow of the brand champion's division and the remaining breed champions.

Barrow Classification Standards

All animals must be properly ear notched within seven (7) days of birth with a litter notch in the right ear and individual notch in the left ear to be eligible for the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Animals not properly notched in both ears will be disqualified.

BERKSHIRE

Black and white with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.

A Berkshire must have white on face and tail (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white.

A Berkshire must NOT have a solid white or a solid black face from the ears forward.

A Berkshire must NOT have a solid black nose (rim of nose).

White is allowed on the ears, but neither ear can be entirely white.

An occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

CHESTER WHITE

Must possess Chester White breed character.

Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.

Ears must be down and medium size.

Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

DUROC

Must be red in color and possess Duroc Breed Character (ears must be down and medium size)

Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.

Must NOT have any black hair.

Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.

Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.

HAMPSHIRE

Must be black in color with a white belt starting on a front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body.

Must possess Hampshire Breed character. (ears must be erect and not rounded)

Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.

Must NOT have any red hair.

No white over rim of nose.

LANDRACE

Must be white in color and possess Landrace Breed character. (ears must be down).

Must NOT allow any color hair other than white.

Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.

Must NOT allow any spot of skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

POLAND CHINA

Must possess Poland China breed character.

Must be black with a white face and switch (unless tail is docked). Three of the four legs must be white. May have an occasional splash of white on the body.

Must have ears down.

Must not have evidence of belt formation.

Cannot have any red or sandy hair and/or pigment.

Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.

SPOTTED SWINE

Must be black and white.

Must possess Spotted Breed character.

Ears cannot be erect.

Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.

No solid black head from ears forward.

No distinct white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.

Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

YORKSHIRE

Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire Breed character. (ears must be erect)

Must NOT have any colored hair other than white.

Must NOT have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.

Must not have masking above the eyes larger than a silver dollar.

Special Rules for Market Steers

1. Validation

To be eligible to enter, all market steers must be validated with the Texas Steer Validation Program administered by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency, division of Agriculture Science and Technology. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to have hair follicle samples collected for DNA analysis by the Official Show Veterinarian, or his/her designated agent on the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market steer, as well as any other randomly selected market steers. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal shall be disqualified and all trophies, awards and premium auction money received by the exhibitor in connection with this exhibit shall be forfeited and the exhibitor's immediate family shall have a permanent life-time ban from entering or participating in any event sponsored or produced by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

Any steer validated with a State Validation Tag will pay a BCYLS entry fee and fill out an entry card for this division.

2. Minimum Weight, Weigh Cards and Weigh Back

Steers must weigh at least 1,050 pounds at the time that weigh-cards are due.

For the 2010 show, official weights will be recorded by exhibitors on official Brazos County Youth Livestock Show weigh cards. These cards will be distributed by the division chairperson(s) to exhibitors during arrival and check-in. Weigh cards will be due by 1:00 p.m. on Saturday March 27th.

1st and 2nd place steers in each class will be re-weighed. Steers weighing more or less than 5% of their official weigh-in weight will be disqualified.

3. Clipping

Steers must be clipped so hair is no more than 1/4 inch long anywhere except the tail switch. Re-checking of hair length will be completed at time designated in the show schedule.

4. Grooming

The original color patterns of the steer(s) cannot be altered.

5. Handling

Steers that are wild or unruly or require handling by more than one person will be disqualified and excused from the arena. If an unruly steer breaks away from an exhibitor three times during class, the steer will be disqualified. Nose leads are permitted during sifting and showing. Only show officials or management will be allowed to assist exhibitors during showing.

6. Horns

Steers must be dehorned.

7. Release

Steers not eligible for the premium auction will be released immediately after steer judging.

8. Classification

All steers will be classified and shown in one of the following breed divisions (A - American, B British and C - All Other Breeds) provided a minimum of four steers are classified into the American and British divisions. In the event there are not 4 breed classified steers in the American or British breeds, they will be shown in the AOB divisions which requires no minimum. The classification at the show weigh-in will be determined by a 3-person classification team approved by show management. The decision of the classifiers will be based on the following rules and will be final.

- A. American Breeds and Crosses (ABC) - Must be pure blood or crossbred Beefmaster, Brahman, Brangus, Red Brangus, Santa Gertrudis, Simbrah or other American breeds. All steers in this category must show predominate breed characteristics of one of these breeds.
- B. British Breeds - British Breeds must be Angus, Red Angus, Hereford, Polled Hereford and Shorthorn. To exhibit in this division, the steer must be 100% purebred British breed as listed in the above sentence. Any British or English crossbred steers will be shown in the All Other Breed (AOB) classes.
- C. All Other Breeds (AOB) - The AOB classes will be made up of all other breeds and breed crosses not classified into A (American) or B (British) divisions and/or those American and British breeds if there are not four to make a breed division.

9. Classes

All steers in each division will be divided as equally as possible into a maximum of three classes by weight following the weigh-in of all steers at the show by the division chairpersons. However, no class will have less than four head per class. *Example: If four steers make the division, there will be only one class; and if 6 or 7 are in the division, there will still be only one class. If 8 steers make a division, there will be 2 classes, and there must be 12 or more to make the maximum 3 classes.*

10. Champion Selection

Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion steers will be chosen from the 1st and 2nd place steers in each weight division.

The Grand Champion steer is to be chosen from the American, British and AOB division champions. The Reserve Grand Champion steer will be chosen from the remaining division Champions and the Reserve Champion in the division where the Grand Champion steer was selected.

11. Premium Auction

The Grand and Reserve Grand Champions steers must sell even if owned by the same exhibitor; otherwise, each exhibitor is limited to one (1) steer in the premium auction.

For the number of sale lots and how they will be selected, see the premium auction section in the general rules.

12. Herdsmanship

Each exhibitor will be responsible for cleaning his/her steer area at the close of the show.

13. Special Awards

Grand Champion Steer Trophy, banner and belt buckle

To be eligible to enter, all market goats must be validated with the Texas Goat Validation Program administered by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency, division of Agriculture Science and Technology. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to have hair follicle samples collected for DNA analysis by the Official Show Veterinarian, or his/her designated agent on the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market goat, as well as any other randomly selected market goat. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal shall be disqualified and all trophies, awards and premium auction money received by the exhibitor in connection with this exhibit shall be forfeited and the exhibitor's immediate family shall have a permanent life-time ban from entering or participating in any event sponsored or produced by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

2. Animal Eligibility

Only wether meat goats can show in the market goat division. The wether class is open to any breed or crossbreed of goats.

3. Terminal Show

The meat goat show is terminal. Following the show, the destination of all meat goats will be determined by the BCYLA management.

4. Tooth Rule

There should be no eruption of the permanent incisors visible. Teeth will be checked at validation.

5. Horns

All market goats must be dehorned and castrated. Goats with horns more than one inch in length will be sifted. Removal of horns on the show grounds will result in disqualification.

6. **Handling**
Wether goats must be trained to lead.
7. **Clipping**
All wether goats must be slick shorn above the knees and hocks. Tail switch hair is allowed.
8. **Minimum Weight**
Wethers will be weighed-in before the show and must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds.

1. Validation

To be eligible to enter, all market lambs must be validated with the Texas Lamb Validation Program administered by Texas AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency, division of Agriculture Science and Technology. The Brazos County Youth Livestock Association reserves the right to have hair follicle samples collected for DNA analysis by the Official Show Veterinarian, or his/her designated agent on the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market lamb, as well as any other randomly selected market lamb. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal shall be disqualified and all trophies, awards and premium auction money received by the exhibitor in connection with this exhibit shall be forfeited and the exhibitor's immediate family shall have a permanent life-time ban from entering or participating in any event sponsored or produced by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

2. Animal Eligibility

Wether and ewe lambs of any breed may be shown in the market lamb division. Ewe lambs must have a breeder's state scrapie premises tag in their ear when they are checked in at the show. This tag will be checked at validation. Ewes will be checked again for the state premises tag upon arrival at the show. If the ewe lamb does not have a state premises tag, it cannot be shown at the BCYLS.

3. Clipping

All lambs must be slick shorn from the knees and hocks up within two (2) weeks of check-in and have a uniform length of fleece at judging.

4. Minimum Weight

Lambs must weigh at least 85 pounds at the official weigh-in with the exception of Southdowns which must weigh a minimum of 80 pounds at the official weigh-in.

All lambs must be presented for official weighing and class assignment without any blankets, halters or any other paraphernalia which would alter the true weight of the lamb. No scales (other than the show scales) will be permitted in the lamb area.

Re-weighing of the top three (3) lambs in each class will be left to the discretion of the Show Officials. Any lamb weighing six (6) pounds more or six (6) pounds less than its official entry weight will be disqualified.

5. Classes

Each lamb breed division must have at least three (3) lambs of a breed to make a class. If there are not three (3) lambs, they will be combined with another breed. The classes are as follows:

- A. Finewool Rambouillet, Delaine, or a cross between these two breeds.
- B. Finewool Cross A typical first cross finewool with a Suffolk or Hampshire.
- C. Mediumwool All purebred and crosses of Southdown, Shropshire, Cheviot, and Dorset, as well as purebred Hampshire, Corriedale, Columbia, and Suffolk breeds.
- D. Southdown This is the only breed in this class. If there are less than three (3) Southdowns as determined by the official classifiers, they will be shown in the mediumwool class.

The market lambs within any breed division shall be divided into classes following the official weighing by the market lamb division chairpersons.

6. Champion Selection

Each breed will have a champion and reserve champion. The champion will be selected from the 1st place lambs in each weight class of that particular breed. The second place lamb from the class of which the breed champion was selected will be eligible to compete for reserve breed champion honors.

A Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion on the entire market lamb division will be selected. Each breed champion will compete for Grand Champion Lamb. The reserve champion lamb in the breed from which the Grand Champion Lamb was selected will be eligible to compete for Reserve Grand Champion lamb honors.

7. Terminal Show

The lamb show is terminal except for ewe lambs not participating in the Premium Auction. These may be taken home by the exhibitor and used in a breeding program. Following the show, the destination of all lambs will be determined by the BCYLA management.

8. Classification

Lambs will be classified by an official 3-person classification team at the official weigh-in for the show. Lambs that do not meet a specific breed classification will be moved to their appropriate breed. The decision of the classifiers is final.

9. Sifted Animals

Sifted lambs will be marked, nose printed, have their tag number recorded and be removed from the area by show management.

10. Premium Auction

If there are less than 80 head of lambs officially weighed-in, the sale order selection method will be utilized.

If the sale order selection procedure is used, **NO ADULTS WILL BE ALLOWED TO EXHIBIT LAMBS TO THE JUDGE.**

Special Rules for Market Rabbits

1. Eligibility

The exhibitor may purchase meat rabbits from any source. **NOTE: Exhibitors DO NOT have to own the doe at the time the rabbits are kindled.**

No crossbred rabbits will be allowed to show as a market pen.

2. Entry

Entries in the market rabbit division must be received by the Treasurer of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association. All entry cards must be signed by a County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher. Checks should be made payable to the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association. An entry will consist of a pen of three (3) rabbits weighing between three (3) and five (5) pounds each and with a maximum age of 69 days as of the show date. Once a pen of rabbits have been weighed-in, a replacement pen will not be accepted. Rabbits must be selected before arriving at the show.

One exhibitor may enter two (2) pens of market rabbits.

3. Judging

Rabbits will be sifted upon arrival by the judge. The American Rabbit Breeders Association Standard of Perfection will be used in the judging standards, disqualifications, and faults. Only the exhibitor or substitute may place or remove rabbits on the check-in and show tables.

4. Diseased Animals

Any diseased rabbits will be disqualified by the judge and refused entry into the show.

5. Pens

Pens will be furnished for the market rabbit entries.

6. Release

Rabbit pens must stay cooped up until after the market rabbit awards. After the presentation of the market rabbit awards, the rabbit pens other than the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion must be removed from the show grounds.

7. Feeding

The exhibitor will be responsible for feeding and watering their entries during this show. Extra feed must be removed from the show barn following judging.

8. Tattooing

Purpose:

The purpose of the commercial steer show is to encourage more 4-H Club members and FFA members to participate in a practical beef production program. Emphasis on economy in the feeding operation is not only recommended, but it is a prerequisite for entry in this show.

Special Rules for Commercial Steers

1. Eligibility

Purebred, grade, or crossbred steers of any of the beef breeds are eligible to be entered in the junior commercial steer show.

Steers being fed for the junior commercial steer show must have been weaned prior to the official entry and tag-in date. Nurse cows are not permitted in this program.

2. Entry

An exhibitor may start with no more than four (4) steers in the junior commercial steer program. These four (4) steers must be kept and fed separately from any other cattle during this feeding program.

Any animal tagged with a BCYLA or State Validation tag will pay an entry fee and fill out an entry card for this division.

Official entry, tagging and weigh-in for the commercial steers will be held at the Brazos Valley Livestock Commission Company. This will be the only day for entering steers.

Entry of only one (1) pen per exhibitor will be accepted. This one (1) pen will consist of three (3) steers.

3. **Project Visit**

A validation committee, consisting of two (2) members appointed by the division chairperson, will make a scheduled visit to the feeding project on location during the last ninety (90) days of the feeding period.

4. **Minimum and Maximum Weights**

A minimum of two steers must weigh 1,050 pounds or more at the weigh-in for the show. There will be a 3% tolerance on the minimum weight. Steers weighing more than 1,450 pounds will be allowed to show, but the official sale weight for the junior commercial steer auction will be 1,450 pounds.

5. **Horns**

Steers must be dehorned or horns must be clipped short. Otherwise, they will not be accepted in the show.

6. **Handling**

Steers need not be halter broken. No wild or unruly animals will be accepted. If it were necessary to remove one or more unruly animals from a pen, this would disqualify the entire pen. They will be shown in a group as pens.

7. **Diseased Animals**

All steers must be healthy and free from disease in the judgment of the livestock superintendent or they will not be accepted.

8. **Records**

All exhibitors must enter the feeding records contest and bring complete records of show on forms prescribed and furnished by the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association. A written examination and a personal interview will not be conducted unless complete records have been turned in to the division chairperson.

9. **Judging**

The grading portion of this contest will use ultrasound (20% of total score). Ultrasound procedures will be performed by a certified ultrasound technician on all steers at final weigh-in. This will assist in exhibitors to choosing their pen of three. All steers must grade select or better to stay in the show. If any steer in a pen grades below select (i.e. standard and lower), it will be sifted and no points will be awarded for **THAT** steer for quality and yield grade, REA, and % IMF. Additionally, each steer grading standard or lower **WILL NOT** be sold in premium auction.

Special Rules for the Family and Consumer Sciences Division

1. Eligibility

Exhibition is open to any eligible 4-H, FFA, and FCCLA member within Brazos County. Entrants MUST be members of the Brazos County Youth Livestock Association.

2. Entry

An official entry form will be available on the BCYLA website: www.bcyala.net. Only one exhibitor's name and signature will be allowed on the entry form.

Completed entry with applicable fees are due at validation. **A recipe for each Baked and Canned good is also due at validation.** No early entries will be accepted.

An entry fee of \$3.00 per item entered will be payable with the entry form. Late entries for the FCS division will be accepted after the entry deadline until the Friday preceding the BCYLS (i.e. one week prior to the show). A penalty of ten (10) times the specified entry fee will be assessed (\$30 per entry).

Each exhibitor may have more than one (1) entry per class; however, the grand champion and reserve champion of the baked and canned goods classes will not be awarded to the same exhibitor. Each item exhibited must be the work of the exhibitor in whose name it is entered. All items must have been completed since the last year's BCYLS.

3. Identification and Submission of Items

Each item exhibited will be assigned a number, and that number will be placed on the entry card on the day of the show. The exhibitor's name will not be entered on the item or the entry card during judging.

Canned Goods – Must follow basic canning principles, including heat sealing. Each canned good must be non-decorated and in a sealed (paraffin covering is optional) regulation standard pint or quart sized jelly jar. The jar must be clean on the outside with no rust on the ring or lid. **Must submit a copy of the recipe at validation and bring a copy with the product on the day of the show.** The recipe must specify all steps used in the preparation of the product.

Baked Goods – Must be baked in an oven. Must be non-decorated (simple garnishing is acceptable) and placed in a disposable container (plastic pan with dome lid, aluminum pan with lid, or cardboard disk with plastic wrap cover). Any items not presented in a disposable container will be refused at the time of admittance. Small items such as cupcakes, cookies, and bars are to be exhibited in groups of six. Items that are pre-sliced or cut into parts will not be accepted (except for cookie bars that are cut for grouping of 6). **Must submit a copy of the recipe at validation and bring a copy with the product on the day of the show.** The recipe must specify all steps used in preparation of the product.

Clothing Items – A clothing garment should be exhibited on a hanger and enclosed in a clear plastic bag.

Photography Items – Exhibitor may enter a maximum of four (4) photos. Each photograph MUST be 8 inches by 10 inches in dimension. All prints MUST be PERMANENTLY mounted solid on mount board (mat board material) or a thin foam board no larger than 8 inches by 10 inches. Matting (of any kind) or framing is NOT allowed and will result in disqualification.

Each entry must include the following information to ensure proper entry: Title of Photo, Camera, Film, Speed, Software Used. The information must be legibly printed or typed on a 3" x 5" sheet of paper and securely affixed to the back of the photo in the center. Items required on all labels: Title of Photo, Camera, Film, Speed, Software Used.

Exhibitors MUST be able to provide original negatives, disk or print, if requested. **The BCLYS Family and Consumer Sciences Committee reserves the right to refuse inappropriate or unsuitable entries.**

Ornamental Horticulture Items – An ornamental horticulture exhibit must be in a container and may not weigh more than 15 pounds.

4. **Refrigeration**

For category C, exhibitors should take pictures of the materials before they begin (1-2), take pictures throughout the design process (5-8), then take pictures of the finished design (1-2).

Pictures must be taken and be placed in the portfolio to show the progression of the project, but are not to include the exhibitor. The exhibitor must take 2-3 pictures at the beginning of the project and then 2-3 pictures at the 1st and 15th day of each month for the duration of the project. Each photo should indicate the date in some way (either written or included on the actual photo).

Exhibitors must submit a portfolio with the project at the time of check in. The portfolio must include:

- List of Materials
- Procedure
- Pictures of the Progression
- Maintenance notes (such as watering, fertilizing, pruning, etc.)
- Reflection (explain what you learned, how you would improve your project)
- A signature page with an AST or CEA signature.

9. Awards

For each age group in each class, Best of the Class and 2nd Best of the Class will receive rosettes. Prizes will be awarded based on availability. All entries will receive ribbons based on merit. The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Baked Goods and Canned Goods will receive trophies and banners. Other class champions will receive plaques.

10. Premium Auction

The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Baked Goods and Canned Goods will be sold at the auction. BCYLS Queen Contest Rules

2. Application

Following this time period, a follow-up meeting will occur and each contestant will have one (1) hour to write an essay related to the researched question.

3. Expectations

Each contestant will be expected to participate in the pre-sale of tickets for the scholarship dance, media appearances and a pre-judging learning class.

4. Duties

Queen and princesses duties are:

Special Rules for the Livestock Judging Contest and Clinic

1. Eligibility

All 4-H and FFA members of Brazos County and exhibitors in the Brazos County Youth Livestock Show from surrounding counties, as defined in the general rules are eligible to enter this contest and clinic.

2. Age Requirements

The judging contest and clinic will be conducted on an individual basis. There will be 3 age divisions. Age categories are determined by the contestant's birthday as of September 1st the previous year. They are:

3. Classes

Each class will consist of four (4) animals.

Animals within a class will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Twelve (12) minutes will be allowed for the contestants to make their observations and record their placing for each class.

The official placing and class critique will be given following the placing of each individual class.

Classes presented for judging will consist of eight (8) classes of the following:

- A. Breeding heifers
- B. Market barrows
- C. Breeding gilts
- D. Market lambs
- E. Market steers
- F. Market goats

4. Awards

Ribbons only (placing 1st through 10th) will be awarded for each age division.

A trophy for the overall high point individual in each age division will also be awarded.

Premium Auction:

NO AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS PROJECTS WILL BE SOLD ON THE PREMISES OR PARTICIPATE IN THE BCYLS PREMIUM AUCTION!

Special Rules for Agriculture Mechanics Project Show:

1. Eligible Entries: Exhibition is open to any eligible 4-H, FFA and FCCLA member within Brazos County. Entrants MUST be members of the BCYLA.
2. Ownership: Projects may have been individually or group constructed and may be individually or chapter owned.
3. Club Entries: Entries made in the name of FFA Chapters or 4-H Clubs are not eligible. All projects must be entered in the names of the exhibitors who participated in planning and construction of the project.
4. Maximum Entries: Each exhibitor may enter up to five individual or up to five group projects or a combination of up to five individual and group projects. No exhibitor may enter more than five projects, either group and/or individually constructed.
5. Ineligible Projects: Any project that does not fit into one of the stated classes will be disqualified.
6. Construction Date: A project can be exhibited only one time at the BCYLS and must have been completed within one calendar year of the exhibition date.
7. Project Presentation: All projects must be painted or properly treated and must be clean and in a presentable condition, even though they may have been used. Due to limited primary exhibit space, trailers and other equipment are to be displayed in transport position. Operation of ramps, extension and other special features may be demonstrated only as directed by official judges and as space permits.
8. Trailer Registration: Current registration plates or one trip permits and paper plates are required on all trailers that are towed to the project show. Hauled trailers will be exempt from this rule.
9. Documentation: An original (exhibitor drawn) plan or drawing, a bill of materials and photographs showing all phases of construction are to be provided with projects. TxDOT and/or ASABE regulations and specifications are to be provided as they apply to individual projects.
10. Project Safety : Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels and other projects that need support. Sharp edges and points, such as found on self feeder roofs, bale movers, etc., are to be padded or covered as necessary to prevent injury. All trailers and other equipment that is to be operated and/or transported on public roads are to be equipped with the safety equipment specified in Title 7, Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of Texas Statutes, Specific chapters regarding width (621.201), lights and reflectors (545.106, 547.324 and 547.401), length (621.201) are to be

adhered to. Any trailer that exceeds 102 inches in width must have a signed permit. All towed equipment, regardless of standards, is to be equipped with safety chains. All three-point hitch and P.T.O. operated equipment are to meet current ASABE standards.

11. Electrical Safety:

All 120 VAC and higher electrical plugs and receptacles are to be the equipment grounding type. All metal components are to be grounded. Ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCI) shall be provided for all 120 VAC receptacles. All 50 VAC and higher connections are to be protected in appropriate indoor or outdoor rated enclosures.

12. General Safety:

Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be used, stored or sprayed inside of any BCYLS building at any time. This shall include, but not be limited to, enamel paints, thinners, reducers, gasoline, or any other petroleum based liquids. All liquids must be in properly labeled original containers. All compressed gas cylinders shall be properly secured in place. Hand wheels are to be removed. Protective caps installed and taped. No regulators or hoses are to be installed at any time. Electric extension cords shall not cross aisles used as exit ways.

13. Projects w/ Engines:

There is to be no more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank. The fuel tank cap is to be in place sealed with tape. The battery is to be disconnected. This applies to all engines in the exhibit area.

14. Signs:

All projects are to be identified with standard club exhibitor cards. Additional signs, banners, etc. are encouraged, but are subject to approval by the BCYLS Agricultural Project Show Committee. No "For Sale" signs will be permitted.

15. Judging System:

The Danish System will be used in judging the projects. Projects will be judged on:

Failure to provide all required documentation and information will result in projects being lowered one classification. Ribbons will be presented to the first and second place winners of each division. Ties will be broken by the discretion of the judge.

16. Awards: Ribbons will also be presented to the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion projects. There will be additional prizes awarded as available. Ribbons will be given as follows: Blue, Red, and White.
17. Showmanship: Showmanship awards will be presented to schools, clubs or individuals selected as having presented the best public image. Major considerations in the selection of winners will be as follows:
- A. Appropriate display and presentation of projects
 - B. Appropriate display of project plans, bill-of-materials and photos
 - C. Housekeeping around projects
 - D. Appropriate dress
 - E. Conduct, attitude, and participation of exhibitors

18. Tractor Restoration and Criteria Points:

No lawn or garden tractors allowed. No implements or non-factory accessories allowed. Batteries must be disconnected and cranking or ignition systems must be disabled on all tractors to prevent unauthorized starting while on display. All fuel tank caps are to be in place and sealed with tape, LP- Gas tractors will be exhibited outdoors. Projects will be judged on:

Items to be considered include, but are not limited to: metal preparation, completeness of sheet metal, paint and finish, detail and completeness of components such as wheels, tires, steering wheels, seats, decals, instrument panels, wiring harness, etc. Originality is to include paint color, fasteners, electrical systems, fuel systems, exhaust systems, mechanical systems, original unaltered serial plates, etc.

- d. Within minutes of purchasing the project, you will be asked from a ring attendant to provide your buyers information in written form. Please read the form carefully and provide complete billing information and sign the form.
- e. The Association will bill you for your purchase(s) usually within 30 days of the sale.
- f. **No add-ons from the floor of the sale will be accepted. Use the add-on sheets obtained from the add-on table. The Association wants to emphasize the Premium Buyers and any add-ons from the floor are a distraction from the Premium buyer's publicity.**

ADD-ON BUYERS

You can help exhibitors by pledging a monetary amount of your discretion. This pledge can be made to any eligible exhibitor regardless of whether or not their project made the premium sale. A complete list of all exhibitors is included in the program or at the Add On table.
